April 5th is annual "Gold Star Mothers Day". The following description/explanation is the best I've ever seen on the meaning behind the Blue/Gold Star display (taken from "Hope for the Warriors" website, www.hopeforthewarriors.org)

"The **Blue Star Service Flag** was patented and designed by WWI Army Captain Robert L. Queisser who, at the time, had two sons serving on the front line. The flag quickly became the unofficial symbol of a child in service.

A Gold Star Family can display a **Gold Star Service Flag** for service members who were killed or died, while serving in the Armed Forces, from causes other than dishonorable. The number of gold stars on the flag corresponds to with the number of individuals who were killed or died. A gold star is placed over the blue star on a Blue Star Service Flag so that the blue forms a border and creates Gold Star Service Flag. The U.S. Department of Defense also issues Gold Star lapel pins to immediate family members of a fallen service member of the military. These pins are worn by spouses, parents, and children of service members killed in the line of duty and contain a gold star on a purple circular background.."

The most moving, poignant portrayal of the spirit behind this

concept I've ever seen is in the 1998 film "Saving Private Ryan" - the story of the search for an US Army 101st Airborne paratrooper, James Francis Ryan, who loses all three of his brothers in combat shortly before/during June 6th 1944, D-Day.

Early in the film, there are two scenes that speak to the enormity of the grief when families are face with this situation.

The first scene portrays the Government typing pool where the letters of condolence are prepared for the families of the lost loved ones. The letters of all three brothers are identified, and the order to commence the search for James is ordered.

In the second, at James' Iowa farm boyhood home, his mother displays a Blue Star flag (4 stars) in the kitchen window. She's busy clearing/washing the dishes from an earlier meal. A distant movement catches her eye, and she looks up from the sink. In a distant dust trail, she sees a vehicle approaching the house along the farm road. As it gets closer, she sees the reality - an drab green sedan with a white star on door. She slowly grasps the reality of the moment, and walks to the front door as the car stops in front of the house. As she walks out on the front porch, an Army Officer and a Priest exit from the car. She becomes unsteady on her feet, and slowly lowers herself to sit down as the Priest comes up and holds her hand before the Officer delivers the news. Three of her Blue Stars are about to become Gold.

I'm including a YouTube link to the portion of the movie that contains both scenes. Describing it pales in comparison to watching the moment. It captures the very essence of what Gold Star Mothers Day is about. Even if you've seen the movie, please watch it again. Just copy/paste the link into your Web Browser and experience it for yourself in honor of April 5th, and all of the Gold Star Mothers who have gone through this experience



The Willys Military Jeep



Willys Jeep TUG

The US Military Jeep is a small, compact-size vehicle that is used by all branches of the Military. In the early days of its construction, it was made as a convertible because it did not have a hard roof. It was made of canvas, if any at all.

The Willys Jeep was a four-wheel-drive, short in length and in height, but a good vehicle in muddy, boggy terrain. It had a spare wheel mounted on the side. It had a small, 4-cylinder engine but it was an efficient vehicle, with a speed of around 50 MPH. It was also a standard shift with a clutch. It ran a regular gas, and that made operating it economical. The Jeep, like most vehicles, had maintenance problems, and needed a mechanic

The Jeep was used by many different people - The enlisted soldiers, team-leading Sergeants, and officers. The Jeep was a common vehicle in parades as it was modified to carry the Staff flag with a plaque with the rank insignia of the passenger.

The Air Force announced it was going to sell surplus Jeeps, and wrote my Dad to ask him if he wanted a Jeep to pull the boat with, and he replied "No", so I did not buy one.

One time, I had to take my TUG (see picture above) to the motor pool to get it fixed. I asked the motor pool what they had for me to drive back, and he said "I only have the motor pool TUG, and you can't borrow that". I asked to borrow the telephone and dialed my engine shop, asked for Mr. Harvey. I said, "Mr. Harvey, this is Airman Weaver at the motor pool to turn my TUG in to be fixed, and they don't have one to loan me". Mr Harvey said to put the man on the phone. I said "He wants to talk to you". I heard Mr. Harvey have a conversation with the motor pool. They gave me the motor pool TUG.

Army Reserve Birthday - April 23rd

Average Weather in April for Springfield

Daily high temperatures *increase* by $8^{\circ}F$, from $63^{\circ}F$ to $71^{\circ}F$, rarely falling below $48^{\circ}F$ or exceeding $81^{\circ}F$.

Daily low temperatures *increase* by $9^{\circ}F$, from $43^{\circ}F$ to $51^{\circ}F$, rarely falling below $30^{\circ}F$ or exceeding $63^{\circ}F$.

Over the course of April in Springfield, the length of the day is *rapidly increasing*. From the start to the end of the month, the length of the day increases by *1 hour, 5 minutes*, implying an average daily increase of *2 minutes*, *15 seconds*, and weekly increase of *15 minutes*, *44 seconds*.

The shortest day of the month is *April 1*, with *12 hours, 37 minutes* of daylight and the longest day is *April 30*, with *13 hours, 42 minutes* of daylight.

The latest sunrise of the month in Springfield is 6:59 *AM* on *April 1* and the earliest sunrise is 39 *minutes* earlier at 6:19 *AM* on *April 30*.

The earliest sunset is 7:35 PM on April 1 and the latest sunset is 26 minutes later at 8:01 PM on April 30.

Daylight saving time is observed in Springfield during 2023, but it neither starts nor ends during April, so the entire month is in daylight saving time.

For reference, on *June 21*, the *longest day* of the year, the Sun rises at 5:53 AM and sets 14 hours, 44 minutes later, at 8:36 PM, while on *December 22*, the *shortest day* of the year, it rises at 7:23 AM and sets 9 hours, 36 minutes later, at 4:59 PM.

The growing season in Springfield typically lasts for 6.6 months (203 days), from around April 8 to around October 28, rarely starting before March 21 or after April 28, and rarely ending before October 10 or after November 15.

During April in Springfield, the chance that a given day is within the growing season is *very rapidly increas-ing rising* from *31%* to *92%* over the course of the month.

Ongoing Suicide Prevention

EVERY month is Suicide Prevention month. Always be vigilant for your brothers/sisters that might need help.

Some signs of concerning behavior include:

- Hopelessness, feeling like there is no way out
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings
- Feeling like there is no reason to live
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug use
- Withdrawing from family and friends

If you notice any signs of concerning behavior here are some things you can do:

• Start a conversation: Mention the signs that prompted you to talk to them. Stay calm and let the person know you want to help them. Don't leave the person alone.

• Listen, express concern and reassure the individual: Let the person know you care and that you take the situation seriously. Letting the person know you care will go a long way in establishing a support system.

• Create a safety plan: Ask the person if they have access to anything that could harm them and call for help if you feel the situation is dangerous.

• Get the individual help: Provide resources for the individual. Call the Veteran's crisis line at 1(800)-273 -8255. Or if you feel the situation is severe, take the individual to the closest emergency room or call for help.

History in April

April 1, 1865 - During the American Civil War, Confederate troops of General George Pickett were defeated and cut off at Five Forks, Virginia. This sealed the fate of Confederate General Robert E. Lee's armies at Petersburg and Richmond and hastened the end of the war

April 2, 1865 - General Robert E. Lee informed Confederate President Jefferson Davis that he must evacuate the Confederate capital at Richmond, Virginia. Davis and his cabinet then fled by train.

April 2, 1982 - The beginning of the Falkland Islands War as troops from Argentina invaded and occupied the British colony located near the tip of South America. The British retaliated and defeated the Argentineans on June 15, 1982, after ten weeks of combat, with about 1,000 lives lost.

April 3, 1860 - In the American West, the Pony Express service began as the first rider departed St. Joseph, Missouri. For \$5 an ounce, letters were delivered 2,000 miles to California within ten days. The famed Pony Express riders each rode from 75 to 100 miles before handing the letters off to the next rider. A total of 190 way stations were located about 15 miles apart. The service lasted less than two years, ending upon the completion of the overland telegraph.

April 4, 1949 - Twelve nations signed the treaty creating NATO, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The nations united for common military defense against the threat of expansion by Soviet Russia into Western Europe

April 5, 1856 - African American educator Booker T. Washington was born a slave in Franklin County, Virginia. Freed by the Civil War, he taught himself the alphabet and eventually graduated from an agricultural institute. In June of 1881, he was asked to become the principal of a new training school for blacks at Tuskegee, Alabama. The Tuskegee Institute began in single building with 30 students but through his efforts grew into a modern university.

April 6, 1917 - Following a vote by Congress approving a declaration of war, the U.S. entered World War I in Europe.

April 10, 1942 - During World War II in the Pacific, the Bataan Death March began as American and Filipino prisoners were forced on a six-day march from an airfield on Bataan to a camp near Cabanatuan. Some 76,000 Allied POWs including 12,000 Americans were forced to walk 60 miles under a blazing sun without food or water to the POW camp, resulting in over 5,000 American deaths.

April 10, 1998 - Politicians in Northern Ireland reached an agreement aimed at ending 30 years of violence which had claimed over 3,400 lives. Under the agreement, Protestants and Catholics in Northern Ireland would govern together in a new 108-member Belfast assembly, thus ending 26 years of "direct rule" from London.

April 12, 1861 - The American Civil War began as Confederate troops under the command of General Pierre Beauregard opened fire at 4:30 a.m. on Fort Sumter in Charleston, South Carolina.

April 12, 1981 - The first space shuttle flight occurred with the launching of *Columbia* with astronauts John Young and Robert Crippen aboard. *Columbia* spent 54 hours in space, mak-

ing 36 orbits, then landed at Edwards Air Force Base in California.

April 14, 1865 - President Abraham Lincoln was shot and mortally wounded while watching a performance of *Our American Cousin* at Ford's Theater in Washington. He was taken to a nearby house and died the following morning at 7:22 a.m.

April 15, 1912 - In the icy waters off Newfoundland, the luxury liner *Titanic* with 2,224 persons on board sank at 2:27 a.m. after striking an iceberg just before midnight. Over 1,500 persons drowned while 700 were rescued by the liner *Carpathia* which arrived about two hours after *Titanic* went down.

April 17, 1961 - A U.S.-backed attempt to overthrow Premier Fidel Castro of Cuba failed disastrously in what became known as the Bay of Pigs fiasco. About 1,400 anti-Castro exiles invaded the island's southern coast along the Bay of Pigs but were overrun by 20,000 Cuban soldiers and jailed. Trained and guided by the U.S., the exiles had expected support from U.S. military aircraft and help from anti-Castro insurgents on the island.

April 18, 1775 - The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere and William Dawes occurred as the two men rode out of Boston about 10 p.m. to warn patriots at Lexington and Concord of the approaching British.

April 19, 1989 - Forty-seven U.S. sailors were killed by an explosion in a gun turret on the USS *Iowa* during gunnery exercises in the waters off Puerto Rico.

April 20, 1999 - The deadliest school shooting in U.S. history occurred in Littleton, Colorado, as two students armed with guns and explosives stormed into Columbine High School at lunch time then killed 12 classmates and a teacher and wounded more than 20 other persons before killing themselves.

April 21, 1836 - The Battle of San Jacinto between Texans led by Sam Houston and Mexican forces led by Santa Anna took place near present day Houston. The Texans decisively defeated the Mexican forces thereby achieving independence.

April 26, 1986 - At the Chernobyl nuclear power plant in the Ukraine, an explosion caused a meltdown of the nuclear fuel and spread a radioactive cloud into the atmosphere, eventually covering most of Europe. A 300-square-mile area around the plant was evacuated. Thirty one persons were reported to have died while an additional thousand cases of cancer from radiation were expected. The plant was then encased in a solid concrete tomb to prevent the release of further radiation.

April 28, 1789 - On board the British ship *Bounty*, Fletcher Christian led a mutiny against Captain William Bligh, setting him and 18 loyal crew members adrift in a 23-foot open boat. Bligh survived a 47-day voyage sailing over 3,600 miles before landing on a small island. Christian sailed the *Bounty* back to Tahiti, eventually settling on Pitcairn Island and burning the ship.

April 30, 1789 - George Washington became the first U.S. President as he was administered the oath of office on the balcony of Federal Hall at the corner of Wall and Broad Streets in New York City.

April 30, 1967 - Boxer Muhammad Ali was stripped of his world heavyweight boxing championship after refusing to be inducted into the American military. He had claimed religious exemption.



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
