



MILITARY FAMILY MONTH

Military Family Month dedicates November to military families around the world. The observance recognizes the commitment and dedication these families make to their service members. Their sacrifices make it possible for our military to remain organized and strong. While their service men and women are actively serving, deployed or training, their families provide a vital foundation at home that allows confidence in the field. Spouses and children are often separated from their service member for long periods of time and over great distances. Communication can be patchy and under stressful conditions. And they frequently move, uprooting children and jobs. But, military families are adaptable.

During November, the country honors the military families who make the U.S. Armed Forces strong.

HOW TO OBSERVE

Thank a veteran, active duty, reserve or national guard service member or family member for their service by giving back. Ask your military families how you can support them. Many will not ask when they need it. In many cases, through deployments or other circumstances, military families will band together. But even then that may not be enough. Adopt a military family for the holidays. Offer to run errands for military spouses who may have their hands full with their children or even their pets. Volunteer or donate services to military organizations. Use #MilitaryFamilyMonth to post on social media.

November Weather, Springfield, MO


Daily high temperatures *decrease* by $12^{\circ}F$, from $62^{\circ}F$ to $51^{\circ}F$, rarely falling below $36^{\circ}F$ or exceeding $75^{\circ}F$.

Daily low temperatures *decrease* by $10^{\circ}F$, from $43^{\circ}F$ to $33^{\circ}F$, rarely falling below $20^{\circ}F$ or exceeding $56^{\circ}F$

In Springfield, Missouri, the first day of November is 10 hours, 35 minutes long. The last day of the month is 09 hours, 47 minutes, so the length.

Ongoing Suicide Prevention

Septenber 2020 was designated as Suicide Prevention month. But let's not lose the momentum. Make **EVERY** month Suicide Prevention month. Always be vigilant for your brothers/sisters that might need help.

Some signs of concerning behavior include:

- Hopelessness, feeling like there is no way out
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings
- Feeling like there is no reason to live
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug use
- Withdrawing from family and friends

If you notice any signs of concerning behavior here are some things you can do:

• **Start a conversation**: Mention the signs that prompted you to talk to them. Stay calm and let the person know you want to help them. Don't leave the person alone.

• Listen, express concern and reassure the individual: Let the person know you care and that you take the situation seriously. Letting the person know you care will go a long way in establishing a support system.

• Create a safety plan: Ask the person if they have access to anything that could harm them and call for help if you feel the situation is dangerous.

• Get the individual help: Provide resources for the individual. Call the Veteran's crisis line at 1(800)-273-8255. Or if you feel the situation is severe, take the indi-
