First unofficial month has started out with a bang! With several people calling and asking questions. I'm happy to help! Do not hesitate to call. There is now a dedicated phone for this purpose. 417-306-2504.

Remember to get your intent to file form submitted BEFORE August 10th, 2023 if you think you may be eligible for any disabilities related to the PACT Act. You can call the VA at 800-827 -1000 and they can get the form started for you, or you can create an account at VA.GOV, and start it yourself. You then have 1 year from date of filing to submit paperwork to support the claim. Don't leave money on the table if you are entitled!

This is true for Camp Lejeune claims too! The PACT Act also has a provision know as Camp Lejeune Justice Act of 2022 (CLJA) That specifically addresses those who had been stationed at Camp Lejeune and allows any individual who believes they were (1) exposed to contaminated water for at least 30 days between 1953 and 1987, and (2) have suffered injuries due to the exposure or ingestion of contaminated water. You have to file with Office of the Judge Advocate General of the Navy's Tort Claims Unit (TCU) in Norfolk, VA. Contact them at 757-341-4583, or myself at 417-306-2504 for help.

Again, thank you all for being each others' family during trying times.


Ride safe out there

Here is some background on the crucial role of the US Coast Guard in amphibious operations during WWII, specifically here, at Iwo Jima. The following history focuses on the Iwo



"With the major points in the Philippines secure, the Allies began looking to the final assault on the Japanese islands. Along the route lay Iwo Jima, an island less than four miles long and just over two wide. Allied planners believed the capture of this volcanic island would ease the later operations because it could be used as an emergency air base for crippled heavy bombers returning from missions over Japan. Furthermore, fighters could fly from Iwo Jima and could supply cover for the entire distance to the targets and back.

Nine hundred vessels sailed in the numerous task groups of the Fifth Fleet and in support of the operation. These ships carried expeditionary forces of more than 70,000 Marines, nearly 4,000 men in the naval landing force, and more than 36,000 garrison troops to attack the determined Japanese of 21,000.

The Allies set Feb. 19 as D-Day. The assault forces arrived off the southeast side of the island to land men at seven predetermined beaches stretching only 3,500 yards. Included in these vessels were the Bayfield and the Callaway, 14 LSTs, and the submarine chaser PC-469. With no reefs surrounding the island, the landings promised little difficulty. The attack forces arrived off the beaches before daylight and began debarking troops into the LVTs, and lowered LCMs and LCVPs for the assault. The LVTs landed the first five assault waves. The anticipated good beach conditions unfortunately did not materialize. The surf broke directly on the beach, broaching and carrying the small craft sideways up on the beach. It did not take long for the shore line to become littered with craft.

The successive waves of landing craft had difficulty getting to the beach and likewise became damaged and lost. The Coast Guard coxswains found it necessary to back the craft into the wind and current to keep grounding hard onto the beach. The beachmasters, salvage parties and beach parties normally kept the beaches clear, but due to the intense Japanese mortar fire, none of these men could remain on the beach. Therefore the coxswains in the landing craft had to take all the initiative to get to the beach, unload, and back off. The wreckage eventually caused the beach to be closed to everything smaller than an LCT until tugs and other craft cleared it for later waves to disembark troops and supplies.

The Coast Guard landed Marine divisions along with their gear, bulldozers, vehicles, rations, small arms, water, and virtually everything that would keep the landing forces moving inland. One of the most enduring images of the capture of the island is the Marines raising the American flag on Mt. Suribachi. Interestingly both the LST-779 and the LST-758 claimed the honor of suppling one of the flags used during the raising on Mt. Suribachi."

From June-December 2021, the Post 639 Newsletter published monthly sections of an interview with Post 639 member **Sgt. Ed**

Fox, regarding his memories/perspectives of the Battles of Midway and Iwo Jima. In honor of the US Coast Guard Birthday on August 4th, I thought it would be appropriate to republish an excerpt from Sgt Ed Fox's interview, published in November 2021. in this excerpt, he references the approach to Iwo Jima beaches in an LCVP (Higgins Boat), piloted by a US Coast Guardsman.

"A Coast Guardsman on our LCVP (Landing Craft Vehicle Personnel) took us in to Red Beach under Suribaci, part of our FO team along with Marines from the 27th Inf. As we got closer to the beach we began to experience in-coming, the LCVP that was next to us took a direct hit, and some of the contents of that boat landed in ours. We had razed the Coastie to put us on dry land or we were going to seek him out when we got back if he dumped us in the water before the beach. But he was something, I didn't have to wade. Hats off to the Coastie."

Hats off to the U.S. Coast Guard indeed. The contributions of the Coast Guard to amphibious landings, both prior to and after Iwo Jima, were as indispensable as they were immeasurable. That continues today with their current mission in support/ protection of the freedoms we enjoy.

Happy Birthday to the US Coast Guard on August 4th. Semper Paratus (Always Ready) !!!!!!!!!





Average Weather in August for

Springfield

Daily high temperatures *decrease* by $3^{\circ}F$, from $88^{\circ}F$ to $85^{\circ}F$, rarely falling below $77^{\circ}F$ or exceeding $97^{\circ}F$.

Daily low temperatures *decrease* by $4^{\circ}F$, from $69^{\circ}F$ to $65^{\circ}F$, rarely falling below $56^{\circ}F$ or exceeding $75^{\circ}F$.


Over the course of August in Springfield, the length of the day is *rapidly decreasing*. From the start to the end of the month, the length of the day decreases by *1 hour*, *2 minutes*, implying an average daily decrease of *2 minutes*, *4 seconds*, and weekly decrease of *14 minutes*, *31 seconds*.

The shortest day of the month is *August 31*, with *13 hours, 1 minute* of daylight and the longest day is *August 1*, with *14 hours, 3 minutes* of daylight.

The earliest sunrise of the month in Springfield is 6:17 AM on August 1 and the latest sunrise is 25 minutes later at 6:42 AM on August 31.

The latest sunset is 8:20 PM on August 1 and the earliest sunset is 37 minutes earlier at 7:43 PM on August 31.

Daylight saving time is observed in Springfield during 2023, but it neither starts nor ends during August, so the entire month is in daylight saving time.

History in August

August 1, 1944 - Anne Frank penned her last entry into her diary. "[I] keep on trying to find a way of becoming what I would like to be, and what I could be, if...there weren't any other people living in the world." Three days later, Anne and her family were arrested and sent to Nazi concentration camps. Anne died at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp on March 15, 1945, at age 15.

August 1, 1779 - *Star-Spangled Banner* author Francis Scott Key was born in Frederick County, Maryland. After witnessing the British bombardment of Fort McHenry on the night of September 13-14, 1814, he was enthralled to see the American flag still flying over the fort at daybreak. He then wrote the poem originally entitled *Defense of Fort McHenry which became the U.S. National Anthem in 1931.*

August 2, 1776 - In Philadelphia, most of the 55 members of the Continental Congress signed the parchment copy of the Declaration of Independence.

August 3, 1492 - Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, with three ships, *Nina*, *Pinta* and *Santa Maria*. Seeking a westerly route to the Far East, he instead landed on October 12th in the Bahamas, thinking it was an outlying Japanese island.

August 5, 1861 - President Abraham Lincoln signed into law the first Federal income tax, a 3 percent tax on incomes over \$800, as an emergency wartime measure during the Civil War. However, the tax was never actually put into effect.

August 6, 1945 - The first Atomic Bomb was dropped over the center of Hiroshima at 8:15 a.m., by the American B-29 bomber *Enola Gay.* The bomb detonated about 1,800 ft. above ground, killing over 105,000 persons and destroying the city. Another estimated 100,000 persons later died as a result of radiation effects.

August 7, 1964 - Following an attack on two U.S. destroyers in the Gulf of Tonkin off North Vietnam, the U.S. Congress approved the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution, granting President Lyndon B. Johnson authority "to take all necessary measures to repel any armed attack against the forces of the United States and to prevent further aggression."

August 9, 1945 - The second Atomic bombing of Japan occurred as an American B-29 bomber headed for the city of Kokura, but because of poor visibility then chose a secondary target, Nagasaki. About noon, the bomb detonated killing an estimated 70,000 persons and destroying about half the city.

August 14, 1945 - V-J Day, commemorating President Truman's announcement that Japan had surrendered to the Allies.

August 15, 1969 - Woodstock began in a field near Max Yasgur's Farm at Bethel, New York. The three-day concert featured 24 rock bands and drew a crowd of more than 300,000 young people. The event came to symbolize the counter-culture movement of the 1960's. August 16, 1896 - Gold was discovered in Rabbit Creek, a tributary of the Klondike River in Alaska, resulting in the Great Klondike Gold Rush.

August 17, 1786 - American frontiersman Davy Crockett was born in Hawkins County, Tennessee. He was a farmer, scout and politician who perished at age 49 during the final heroic defense of the Alamo in Texas.

August 18, 1920 - The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, granting women the right to vote.

August 21, 1863 - During the American Civil War, William Quantrill led 450 irregular Confederate raiders on a pre-dawn terrorist raid of Lawrence, Kansas, leaving 150 civilians dead, 30 wounded and much of the town a smoking ruin. In 1862, Quantrill had been denied a Confederate commission by the Confederate Secretary of War, who labeled Quantrill's notions of war as 'barbarism.'

August 24, 79 A.D. - Vesuvius, an active volcano in southern Italy, erupted and destroyed the cities of Pompeii, Stabiae and Herculaneum.

August 24-25, 1814 - During the War of 1812, Washington, D.C., was invaded by British forces that burned the Capitol, the White House and most other public buildings along with a number of private homes. The burning was in retaliation for the earlier American burning of York (Toronto).

August 25, 1918 - American conductor and composer Leonard Bernstein was born in Lawrence, Massachusetts. Considered one of the finest conductors in American music history, his works included *West Side Story, On the Town*, and the opera *Candide*.

August 26, 1883 - One of the most catastrophic volcanic eruptions in recorded history occurred on the Indonesian island of Krakatoa. Explosions were heard 2,000 miles away. Tidal waves 120 ft. high killed 36,000 persons on nearby islands, while five cubic miles of earth were blasted into the air up to a height of 50 miles.

August 29, 1991 - Following the unsuccessful coup of August 19-21, the Soviet Communist Party was suspended, thus ending the institution that ruled Soviet Russia for nearly 75 years.

August 30, 1797 - *Frankenstein* author Mary Shelly was born in London.

August 31, 1786 - Shays' Rebellion began in Massachusetts as ex-Revolutionary War Captain Daniel Shays led an armed mob. The rebellion prevented the Northampton Court from holding a session in which debtors, mostly poor ex-soldier farmers, were to be tried and likely put in prison. Following this, in September, Shays' troops prevented Supreme Court sessions at Springfield, Massachusetts. Early in 1787, they attacked the Federal arsenal at Springfield, but were soon routed and fled. Shays was sentenced to death but was pardoned in 1788.

Ongoing Suicide Prevention

EVERY month is Suicide Prevention month. Always be vigilant for your brothers/sisters that might need help.

Some signs of concerning behavior include:

- Hopelessness, feeling like there is no way out
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings
- Feeling like there is no reason to live
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug use
- Withdrawing from family and friends

If you notice any signs of concerning behavior here are some things you can do:

• **Start a conversation**: Mention the signs that prompted you to talk to them. Stay calm and let the person know you want to help them. Don't leave the person alone.

• Listen, express concern and reassure the individual: Let the person know you care and that you take the situation seriously. Letting the person know you care will go a long way in establishing a support system.

• Create a safety plan: Ask the person if they have access to anything that could harm them and call for help if you feel the situation is dangerous.

• Get the individual help: Provide resources for the individual. Call the Veteran's crisis line at 1(800)-273 -8255. Or if you feel the situation is severe, take the individual to the closest emergency room or call for help.
