Greetings fellow veterans! I look forward to being your Service Officer and will do what I can to help any of you with issues or concerns. I've met with a few staff at the local VA, to get information, and to create my own network to better serve you.

The **NUMBER ONE** thing I just found out for all Vietnam Veterans is that they are **BACK DATING** all claims **ONE YEAR** filed for presumptive conditions that are filed before August 10th, 2023. They will be backdated to August 10th 2022. Which means you would get back pay automatically to Aug 2022 if your claim is approved and awarded. The 2 new Presumptive conditions are: high blood pressure (hypertension) and Monoclonal Gammopathy of Undetermined Significance (MGUS). There are 19 total presumptive conditions.

I will make available the conditions and locations required to confirm your eligibility. This list will be posted at the LZ639.

I cannot file for you. I am not licensed and certified to submit. These offices listed below have direct software to the VA to submit correctly and timely. Call for your appointments today to get your disability claims started.

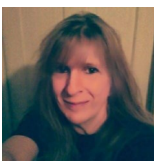

Missouri Veterans Commission

In October 2022, MVC instituted a program to provide free Estate Planning Services to veterans. To date, we have held 34 clinics and served around 900 people. I don't have exact figures in front of me, but we have produced around 3,500 documents for veterans and their spouses saving them approximately \$1.75 million dollars in legal fees. We provide wills, trusts, advanced directives, and powers of attorney for Healthcare and finances. Additionally, I recently started offering in loco parentis powers of attorney (empowering someone to care for your child in your absence), and beneficiary deeds and personal property designations so people can keep their entire estate out of probate.

The schedule for upcoming clinics is displayed at the end of this section. Plus we have an ongoing clinic on the last Monday of each month at the Truman VA Hospital in Columbia.

Post 639 Member Nolan Moody has been selected as an inductee into the Class of 2023 Missouri Veterans' Hall of Fame.



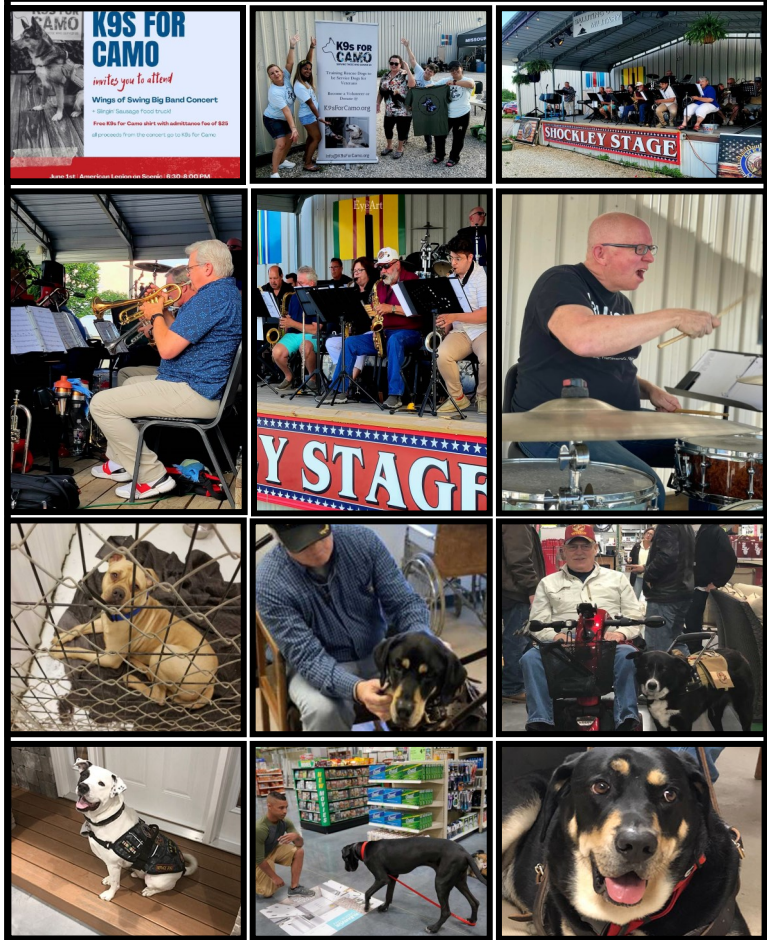

Average Weather in July for

Springfield

Daily high temperatures *increase* by 2°F, from 86°F to 89°F, rarely falling below 80°F or exceeding 97°F. The highest daily average high temperature is 89°F on July 27.

Daily low temperatures are around 68°F, rarely falling below 61°F or exceeding 75°F. The highest daily average low temperature is 69°F on July 22.

Over the course of July in Springfield, the length of the day is *decreasing*. From the start to the end of the month, the length of the day decreases by 36 minutes, implying an average daily decrease of 1 minute, 12 seconds, and weekly decrease of 8 minutes, 26 seconds.

The shortest day of the month is July 31, with 14 hours, 5 minutes of daylight and the longest day is July 1, with 14 hours, 41 minutes of daylight.

The earliest sunrise of the month in Springfield is 5:56 AM on July 1 and the latest sunrise is 20 minutes later at 6:17 AM on July 31.

The latest sunset is 8:37 PM on July 1 and the earliest sunset is 16 minutes earlier at 8:21 PM on July 31.

Daylight saving time is observed in Springfield during 2023, but it neither starts nor ends during July, so the entire month is in daylight saving time.

History in July

July 1, 1863 - Beginning of the Battle of Gettysburg during the American Civil War.

July 2, 1776 - The Continental Congress in Philadelphia adopted the following resolution, originally introduced on June 7, by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia: "Resolved, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved. That it is expedient forthwith to take the most effectual measures for forming foreign Alliances. That a plan of confederation be prepared and transmitted to the respective Colonies for their consideration and approbation."

July 2, 1788 - Congress announced the United States Constitution had been ratified by the required nine states and that a committee had been appointed to make preparations for the new American government.

July 3, 1775 - During the American Revolution, George Washington took command of the Continental Army at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

July 4, 1776 - The Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress.

July 5, 1775 - The Continental Congress adopted the Olive Branch Petition expressing hope for a reconciliation with Britain. However, King George III refused even to look at the petition and instead issued a proclamation declaring the colonists to be in a state of open rebellion.

July 6, 1747 - Revolutionary War Naval Officer John Paul Jones was born in Kirkbean, Scotland. He is best remembered for responding "I have not yet begun to fight!" to British opponents seeking his surrender during a naval battle.

July 16, 1945 - The experimental Atomic bomb "Fat Boy" was set off at 5:30 a.m. in the desert of New Mexico desert, creating a mushroom cloud rising 41,000 ft. The bomb emitted heat three times the temperature of the interior of the sun and wiped out all plant and animal life within a mile.

July 16, 1969 - The Apollo 11 Lunar landing mission began with a liftoff from Kennedy Space Center at 9:37 a.m.

July 19, 1863 - During the American Civil War, Union troops made a second attempt to capture Fort Wagner near Charleston, South Carolina. The attack was led by the 54th Massachusetts Colored Infantry, commanded by Colonel Robert Gould Shaw, who was killed along with half of the 600 men in the regiment. This battle marked the first use of black Union troops in the war.

July 26, 1945 - The U.S. Cruiser Indianapolis arrived at Tinian Island in the Marianas with an unassembled Atomic bomb, met by scientists ready to complete the assembly.

July 27, 1953 - The Korean War ended with the signing of an armistice by U.S. and North Korean delegates at Panmunjom, Korea. The war had lasted just over three years.

Ongoing Suicide Prevention

EVERY month is Suicide Prevention month. Always be vigilant for your brothers/sisters that might need help.

Some signs of concerning behavior include:

- Hopelessness, feeling like there is no way out
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings
- Feeling like there is no reason to live
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug use
- Withdrawing from family and friends

If you notice any signs of concerning behavior here are some things you can do:

- **Start a conversation:** Mention the signs that prompted you to talk to them. Stay calm and let the person know you want to help them. Don't leave the person alone.
- **Listen, express concern and reassure the individual:** Let the person know you care and that you take the situation seriously. Letting the person know you care will go a long way in establishing a support system.
- **Create a safety plan:** Ask the person if they have access to anything that could harm them and call for help if you feel the situation is dangerous.
- **Get the individual help:** Provide resources for the individual. **Call the Veteran's crisis line at 1(800)-273-8255.** Or if you feel the situation is severe, take the individual to the closest emergency room or call for help.

Lessons Learned

The British Attack at Taranto

November 11, 1940

The Attack

Operation MB8, as it was called, was a series of ten operations that were to be executed between November 4th and 14th. They were used in part to disguise the Royal Navy's true goal which was the attack on the Italian fleet at Taranto, code named JUDGEMENT. The reason for such an elaborate operation was to confuse the Italian High Command into thinking that there were no major fleet operations that posed any threat to the Italian Navy, just routine naval traffic.

Two waves of aircraft flew off the deck of the Illustrious shortly after dark seventy miles from Taranto. The first wave consisted of twelve aircraft and the second contained nine. Eleven of the aircraft carried torpedoes, the remaining planes carried either bombs or flares. Taranto's defenses had already been alerted when their listening devices picked up the sound of the incoming aircraft. Once detected, the harbor's anti-aircraft batteries opened up with a deadly hail of anti-aircraft fire. The first wave reached their target. The planes carrying the flares flew inland above and behind the line of defensive barrage balloons and dropped their bright-yellow parachute flares. Once successfully deployed, these flares silhouetted the ships in the outer harbor. Next up was the bomb carrying aircraft which began with an attack on the ports tank farm, seaplane base and smaller ships. The remaining aircraft carrying torpedoes began their attack runs on the Italian battleships. The torpedoes used were specially modified with a wire latch attached to the nose of torpedo and to the belly of the plane. As the torpedo fell, the tension on the wire kept the torpedo nose up so the torpedo belly flopped rather than nosedived into the water. (O'Connor, 2016, p. 6). By doing this, the RAA had addressed the issue of the harbor being too shallow for an airborne torpedo attack. The British torpedoes, armed with duplex pistols, were launched and traveled under the torpedo netting towards their intended targets. The netting was designed to protect the sides of a battleship from contact pistols but not duplex pistol armed torpedoes. The netting did not extend deep enough to prevent torpedoes from going beneath the ships (Caravaggio,

2006, p. 5). As the first wave was moving out, the second wave arrived twenty minutes after the initial attack. Their orders were to attack whichever battleship presented the best target at the time. Again, flare dropping aircraft silhouetted the ships in the harbor and the aircraft armed with bombs made runs on other targets of opportunity. The aircraft carrying torpedoes lined up on their targets and released their payload with deadly results.

After Action Report

The Italians at Taranto unleashed everything they had on the slow, low flying Fairley Swordfish with little results. Of the original twenty-one aircraft launched during the attack, only two failed to return to Illustrious. The damage inflicted on the RMI was decisive. According to Caravaggio:

“When the last Swordfish attack was complete, Italy’s serviceable battleships have been reduced from six to two – only Vittorio Veneto and Giulio Cesare had escaped damage – and all of this had been accomplished with cost of only two Swordfish shot down” (Caravaggio, 2006, p. 10).

As is often the case, history describes battles in terms of ships and planes lost, not the men that had to do the fighting. For their part, the Italians defended their homeland bravely, firing thousands of anti-aircraft rounds. Despite their best efforts, they lost four battleships and over 600 men. The British Fleet Air Arm also had their unsung heroes. Imagine the difficulties of taking off and landing on a pitching, rolling aircraft carrier. Now imagine that same pilot had to perform this same task at night with an airplane fully loaded with fuel and bombs. Once airborne, his mission is to attack the heavily fortified Italian Fleet. If that wasn’t daunting enough, think of those same pilots trying to find a blacked-out aircraft carrier and attempting to land after being badly shot up. In the end, both sides did their duty and fought bravely and deserved a level of respect.

Watch and Learn

News of the attack on Taranto was broadcast around the world in newspapers, radio broadcasts and military communications. The New York Times ran a six-column headline on page one. The Washington Post and Time Magazine also featured articles about the attack. In the House of Commons, Prime Minister Winston Churchill proclaimed that the loss to Italy of half its battleships “affects decisively the balance of naval power in the Mediterranean” (Correll, 2017, p. 1). Like all news stories, it was short lived. It wasn’t long before the headlines covered the exploits of German General Erwin Rommel and the continuing air battle over Great Britain. For some, the Battle of Taranto was just another battle in a larger war. For others it became the beginning of something much bigger.

The Japanese were keenly interest to in the Battle of

Taranto. They sent a group of Japanese naval officers to visit Taranto to gain a better understanding of what took place. Led by Rear Admiral Koki Abe, Imperial Japanese Navy (IJN), they brought with them a long list of questions and interviewed as many witnesses as they could (Correll, 2017). This information was shared with Commander Minoru Genda IJN, a military attaché in London. He would later work closely with Commander Mitsuo Fuchida IJN, and both would later report to Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto, Commander-in-Chief of the Japanese Combined Fleet.

The Americans were also interested in the details of the attack. Prior to the battle they sent a naval attaché aboard the aircraft carrier Illustrious to observe the attack. Lieutenant Commander Opie USN was given full access by the British to observe every aspect of the battle, including conversations with the pilots. After the battle he made his way to the American Legation in Cairo where he submitted a four-page report on the details of the attack on Taranto (O’Connor, 2016, p. 4). Opie carefully documented everything he witnessed and passed that information on to the Office of Naval Intelligence (ONI). Within a month of the attack Lieutenant Commander Opie’s reports were summarized and made their way to the desk of Admiral Husband E. Kimmel Commander-in-Chief of the United States Pacific Fleet, based at Pearl Harbor.

Conclusions

The attack at Taranto was a turning for the British in the battle for control of the Mediterranean. The Italians were still a formidable enemy and many of the ships sunk or disabled would return to active duty later in the war. In terms of the military thinking it marked the beginning of the end of the Battleship reign as the primary instrument of naval warfare. Admiral Sir Andrew Cunningham, who commanded the attack, said that the future of naval warfare:

“Taranto and the night of November 11–12, 1940, should be remembered for ever as having shown once and for all that in the Fleet Air Arm the Navy has its most devastating weapon” (Flank, 2021).

In addition to the change in naval thinking about the role of the battleship, the attack on Taranto also made it abundantly clear that fleets were no longer safe in their harbors. For some, this realization was apparent and for others it was still a subject for debate. On November 26, 1941, a Japanese task force of six aircraft carriers sailed under the cover of a storm across the Pacific. On the morning of December 7, 1941 Commander Genda IJN stood on the

Bridge of the aircraft carrier Akagi, and overlooked a flightdeck filled with fighters, bombers and torpedo bombers waiting to launch. In the lead aircraft was Commander Fuchida



IJN waiting for his orders to roll down the flightdeck. With a nod, Vice Admiral Chūichi Nagumo, the task force commander, gave the order to launch aircraft. Their target, the heavily fortified and shallow water base at Pearl Harbor, home of the United States Navy's Pacific Fleet, but that is another story.
