# Post 639 Historian



In my monthly search for a historical topic, I ran across this poem, posted by Post 639's Nolan Moody - "From a Doc's Point of View ... " As February 19th is the anniversary of the beginning of the Battle of Iwo Jima, it seemed very appropriate to honor the Navy Corpsmen (Docs) who, imbedded with their Marines, took part in that battle.

The author is referenced as "Doc Hutch". I did some research on the name to see if I could identify the actual Corpsman called "Doc Hutch", but to no avail. Whoever he is, he represents his Brother/Sister Corpsmen with the following poem .....

#### FROM A DOC'S POINT OF VIEW .....

"As a Corpsman in green and not navy blue, I offer this poem from a Doc's point of view. We've been honored by stories, poems and such By Marines we have served with and respected so much.

They speak of our honor, bravery and skill, And the cry, "Corpsman up!" still gives me a chill. When a Marine goes down, what will it be? A trache? Tie of bleeders? Start an IV?

Only one thing is certain as we rush to the scene, Our ass will be covered by our brothers in green. You see, we're adopted, "Sons of the Corps". No more "Anchors Aweigh" - "Semper Fi" evermore!

It's true when you're wounded, your life's in our hands, And we'll treat and protect you to the very last man. For you are our point man, our cover, our shield, And we count on your skills all our days in the field.

Many a grunt laid his life on the line, To make sure Doc got to the wounded in time. So, my brothers, I thank you, as all us Docs should. It's YOU who make us Corpsman look good! "

The following content is from "Hospital Corpsman of Iwo Jima: Stories Valor and Sacrifice" .....

Pharmacist's Mate Second Class Stanley Dabrowski, of New Britain, Conn., who remembered the "tremendous noise," concussion of small arms fire, explosions of artillery and sounds

of shells. "As we were coming into the beach we were under a rolling barrage of 16-inch guns of the battleships. You could just feel those shells going over your head."

Casualties were immense, and outside of Marine litter bearers corpsmen suffered the largest casualty rate. As in previous battles, corpsmen serving on Iwo were targets of snipers, but were also killed and injured while going into harm's way to treat casualties. Corpsman were often singled out because they "looked" different.

Dabrowski recalled that Corpsmen were often singled out because they "looked different."

"We carried [medical kits] which I didn't like at all because they marked us as corpsmen. . . because of this, we were told to carry side-arms not as offensive weapons but for self-protection."

Despite the fact that the 4th and 5th Marine Divisions on Iwo Jima were assigned five percent more corpsmen than was allotted by the Marine Corps Tables of Organization, corpsmen losses were too great to overcome. Corpsmen casualties in six battalions exceeded 50 percent. Hospital Corps casualties in one battalion exceeded 68 percent. In the 36-day battle, 332 hospital corpsmen were killed in action or died of their wounds. Another 659 corpsmen were wounded and required evacuation.

Knowing this fact, it is little surprise that Iwo's corpsmen were highly decorated. Iwo corpsmen received a total 14 Navy Crosses (including six posthumous), 108 Silver Stars and 287 Bronze Stars. And among the 27 Medals of Honor awarded to Iwo veterans (the most of any battle in World War II), four were bestowed to hospital corpsmen—Francis Junior Pierce, George Wahlen, Jack Williams, and John Willis.

Thank you, "Doc Hutch" for reminding us of the sacrifice given by so many. Rest assured, the honor and respect you express in your poem is returned by the Marines on ALL battlefields, whom you risked and sacrificed your lives to protect and save. It simply knows no bounds.

#### History in February ....

**February 1, 1960** - In Greensboro, North Carolina, four African American students sat down and ordered coffee at a lunch counter inside a Woolworth's store. They were refused service, but did not leave. Instead, they waited all day.

**February 1, 2003** - Sixteen minutes before it was scheduled to land, the Space Shuttle *Columbia* broke apart in flight over west Texas, killing all seven crew members.

**February 3, 1943** - An extraordinary act of heroism occurred in the icy waters off Greenland after the U.S. Army transport ship *Dorchester* was hit by a German torpedo and began to sink rapidly. When it became apparent there were not enough life jackets, four U.S. Army chaplains on board removed theirs, handed them to frightened young soldiers, and chose to go down with the ship while praying.

**February 3, 1959** - A private plane flying over Clear Lake, Iowa, crashed, taking the lives of rock musicians Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens, and J.P. Richardson, also known as the "Big Bopper". The pilot of the Beechcraft Bonanza, Roger Peterson, was also killed.

**February 6, 1895** - Legendary baseball player George Herman "Babe" Ruth was born in Baltimore, Maryland. Ruth held or shared 60 Major League records, including pitching 29 consecutive scoreless innings and hitting 714 home runs.

**February 9, 1943** - During World War II in the Pacific, U.S. troops captured Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands after six months of battle, with 9,000 Japanese and 2,000 Americans killed.

**February 12, 1809** - Abraham Lincoln, the 16th U.S. President was born in Hardin County, Kentucky. He led the nation through the tumultuous Civil War, freed the slaves, composed the Gettysburg Address, and established Thanksgiving.

**February 13, 1945** - During World War II in Europe, British and American planes began massive bombing raids on Dresden, Germany. A four-day firestorm erupted that was visible for 200 miles and engulfed the historic old city, killing an estimated 135,000 German civilians.

February 15, 1898 - In Havana, the U.S. Battleship *Maine* was

blown up while at anchor and quickly sank with 260 crew members lost. The incident inflamed public opinion in the U.S., resulting in a declaration of war against Spain on April 25, 1898, amid cries of "Remember the Maine!"

**February 19, 1945** - U.S. Marines invaded Iwo Jima after months of naval and air bombardment. The Japanese defenders of the island were dug into bunkers deep within the volcanic rocks. Approximately 70,000 U.S. Marines and 18,000 Japanese soldiers took part in the battle.

**February 20, 1943** - German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel broke through American lines at Kasserine Pass in North Africa as inexperienced U.S. Troops lost their first major battle of World War II in Europe, with 1,000 Americans killed.

**February 20, 1962** - Astronaut John Glenn became the first American launched into orbit. Traveling aboard the "Friendship 7" spacecraft, Glenn reached an altitude of 162 miles (260 kilometers) and completed three orbits in a flight lasting just under five hours.

**February 22, 1732** - George Washington was born in Westmoreland County, Virginia. He served as commander of the Continental Army during the American Revolution and became the first U.S. President.

**February 23, 1942** - During World War II, the first attack on the U.S. mainland occurred as a Japanese submarine shelled an oil refinery near Santa Barbara, California, causing minor damage.

**February 23, 1991** - In Desert Storm, the Allied ground offensive began after a devastating month-long air campaign targeting Iraqi troops in both Iraq and Kuwait.

**February 27, 1991** - In Desert Storm, the 100-hour ground war ended as Allied troops entered Kuwait just four days after launching their offensive against Saddam Hussein's Iraqi forces.

#### Average Weather in February for Springfield ..

Daily high temperatures increase by 9°F, from 45°F to 53°F, rarely falling below 28°F or exceeding 69°F.

Daily low temperatures increase by 7°F, from 27°F to 33°F, rarely falling below 11°F or exceeding 47°F.

Over the course of February in Springfield, the length of the day is *increasing*. From the start to the end of the month, the length of the day increases by 59 minutes, implying an average daily increase of 2 minutes, 11 seconds, and weekly increase of 15 minutes, 14 seconds.

The shortest day of the month is February 1, with 10 hours, 22 minutes of daylight and the longest day is February 28, with 11 hours, 20 minutes of daylight.

The latest sunrise of the month in Springfield is 7:16 AM on February 1 and the earliest sunrise is 30 minutes earlier at 6:45 AM on February 28.

The earliest sunset is 5:37 PM on February 1 and the latest sunset is 28 minutes later at 6:06 PM on February 28.

# **Ongoing Suicide Prevention**

EVERY month is Suicide Prevention month. Always be vigilant for your brothers/sisters that might need help.

#### Some signs of concerning behavior include:

- Hopelessness, feeling like there is no way out
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings
- Feeling like there is no reason to live
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug use
- Withdrawing from family and friends

If you notice any signs of concerning behavior here are some things you can do:

- **Start a conversation**: Mention the signs that prompted you to talk to them. Stay calm and let the person know you want to help them. Don't leave the person alone.
- Listen, express concern and reassure the individual: Let the person know you care and that you take the situation seriously. Letting the person know you care will go a long way in establishing a support system.
- Create a safety plan: Ask the person if they have access to anything that could harm them and call for help if you feel the situation is dangerous.
- Get the individual help: Provide resources for the individual. Call the Veteran's crisis line at 1(800)-273-8255. Or if you feel the situation is severe, take the individual to the closest emergency room or call for help.

## Twenty-Three Crosses - Part 2

(Continued from the January 2024 issue ....)

#### **CONDITION RED**

On May 2,1942 Admiral Chester W. Nimtz, Commander-in-Chief of the United States Pacific Fleet (CINCPACFLT) arrived on Midway to brief the garrisons leadership on the pending attack. The Admiral asked the commanders of Midway, Lieutenant Colonel Shannon and Commander Cyril T Simard, to prepare their defenses and to provide a list of equipment and supplies needed to defend the island. Within a week, three additional three-inch antiaircraft batteries, a thirty-seven- and twenty-millimeter antiaircraft battery and two rifle companies of the second Marine Raider Battalion arrived on Midway and took up defensive positions. The Marine Air Group had grown substantially after Admiral Nimitz visited Midway. In addition to the 28 fighters and bombers of the MAG, the island was also supplemented with 30 Patrol Bomber Consolidated Aircraft (PBYs) four medium B-26s and 17 heavy B-17 bombers. The MAG also received the addition of six Torpedo Bomber Grumman (TBFs). The 6th defense battalion had grown to 1700 men with supporting equipment. The Marines worked hard prepping for the attack. They constructed underwater obstacles, unloaded, and distributed supplies, fortified gun emplacements and built shelters for ammunition and personnel (Melson, 1996). The aircraft and crews of VM -221 stood ready to scramble at a moment's notices. Planes were fueled, ammunition belts were loaded into the plane's wings. Before sunrise, the islands PBYs took to the air searching for the enemy. According to Ed Fox, one of the Marines from the defense battalion, "one hour before sunrise all personnel on the island went to Condition Red" (Fox, 2007). The Commander of the 6th Defense Battalion, Lieutenant Colonel Harold D. Shannon, addressed his men saying "Keep cool, calm and collected; make your bullets count" (Melson, 1996, p. 2). With every gun locked and loaded, pointing towards the sky, the Marines would not have to wait long.

At 05:44 on June 4,1942 a PBY based at Midway, radioed "Many Planes, 93 miles, 310 degrees altitude 11,000 feet" (CAMP, 2020, p. 1), spotted over 50 Japanese planes heading towards Midway. The pilots of VMF-221 were briefed in their makeshift ready-room and developed their battleplans for the day. The squadrons of 26 pilots were divided up into 4 divisions of 5 planes each with the first division having 6. The leaders of each division discussed their groups tactics and wingman responsibilities. Shortly after first contact, Midway's air raid sirens sent the pilots of VMF-221 scrambling towards their aircraft, their clipboards in hand leaving their flight jackets and sunglasses behind in the readyroom. Plane captains stood ready on the wing of each of the planes with the engines idling, waiting for their pilots to jump in the seat so they could be strapped in. Once securely seated the pilots slammed the canopy closed and pushed the throttle forward, not wanting to get caught on the ground when the Japanese arrived. Major "Red" Parks, the squadron commander was first in the air closely followed by the four other Buffalos in his division. The four other divisions followed shortly afterwards. In total twenty-six fighters scrambled into the air with one having to return to base because of engine problems. Radar vectored the fighters slightly above the approaching "V" formation of Japanese aircraft. The Japanese were stacked in three "Vs" consisting of thirty-six Nakajima "Kate" level bombers, thirty-six Aichi D3A1 "Val" dive bombers, and thirty-six Mitsubishi A6M2 Zeros. The Zeros were stationed below the other formations hoping to intercept the American fighters as they rose to meet the incoming attackers. Little did they know they were already in the air looking down on them.

#### SACRIFICE

The pilots of VMF-221 had the advantage of position over the attacking Japanese. Each of the five divisions got into position above and slightly behind the attacking enemy. From this vantage point, the pilots of VMF-221 would have a free pass to swoop down on the unsuspecting enemy. Captain John F. Carey's fifth division was the first to contact the enemy. Captain Carey and his division of five F4f-3 Wildcats pushed their throttles and joy sticks forward and dove on the flight of B5N2 "Kate's". One Kate was seen going down in flames alerting the escorting A6M Zeros. Of the five members of his division, three survived the battle, including Lt. Car-

ey with one dead and another reported as missing. One member to survive was 2Lt. Roy A. Corry. Corry was previously credited with downing a Navy Aichi Type dive bomber and one OO Isento KI Navy Fighter. Lt. Corry was fortunate enough to survive the Battle of Midway only to lose his life during the struggle for Guadalcanal. Another member to survive the battle of Midway was, Captain Marion E. Carl, flying off the airstrip on Guadalcanal would become the Marine Corps first Ace and later be credited with downing eighteen and one-half planes making him the seventh highest scoring Marine Ace of World War 2. Major Parks, the Squadron Commander led his division of five Brewster F2S-3s against a fight of Japanese dive bombers. The Major's flight was immediately jumped by Zeros covering the bombers and his plane was the first to fall. Major Parks was seen bailing out of his burning Brewster. One of the swarming Zeros saw Parks parachute and strafed him multiple times as he slowly descended to earth. The Squadron Commanded ended up landing on a reef while still being strafed by the enemy, he did not survive. Of the Six members of the first division, five went missing and one returned to base prior to the battle because of mechanical issues. The other divisions did not fare any better. Of the 25 aircraft that intercepted the Japanese, 15 were shot down, listed as killed in action, four were wounded in action and only two fighters remained flyable (Camp, 2013, p. 4). According to Admiral Nagumo, the Commander of the Japanese fleet, three bombers and two fighters were shot down by enemy aircraft and four were lost due to anti-aircraft fire (MIDWAY ATOLL UNDER JAPANESE AIR ATTACK, 2007). At 07:15 hours the "All Clear" was sounded and the Commander of Marine Air Group 22, Lieutenant Colonel Kimes broadcast a message to the surviving fighter pilots who were waiting to land "Fighters land. Refuel by divisions. Fifth division first." After repeating the message multiple times and receiving no replies, LtCol Kimes knew the fate of his squadron (MIDWAY ATOLL UNDER JAPANESE AIR ATTACK, 2007). With both the Commanding and Executive Officers missing and most of their pilots and aircraft destroyed, VMF-221 ceased to be a cohesive unit. The remaining two pilots returned to their empty ready room; the chairs still draped with flight jackets, sunglasses and Marine Corps covers left behind by their missing friends. In addition to the pilots, four ordnance men were killed when a Japanese bomb hit a rearming pit of VMF-221 causing eight 100-pound bombs and 10,000 rounds of .50 caliber rounds to cook off. Ed Fox, who

served on Midway with the 6th Defense Battalion and watched the battle unfold said it best when he said,

Later that morning, as I waited for our returning planes – sitting in foliage – hardly a Midway-based plane returned; only a few of our planes – from a carrier, I was told later. So many flew off that day to deny the enemy access to Midway and to protect me; many never to return. To this day, I have the highest respect for those men. They did not know me, nor I them. What they did was their job, that they were trained to do. They gave the ultimate sacrifice though. I have often wondered if I could have been that brave. (Fox, 2007, p. 1)

One hour and twenty minutes after it began, the air battle over the island of Midway ended. Following the battle, LtCol Kimes submitted his after-action report to Admiral Nimitz. Kimes stated that, "The performance of the F2A3 and 4FF-3 types of airplanes, It is recommended that the F2A3 and F4F-3 be not assigned as equipment for use in combat but retained for use at training centers only". (CAMP, 2020, p. 11) The pilots that died that day never knew how the battle ended or the role they played in the eventual victory.

#### TWENTY-THREE CROSSES

The Navy Cross was established by an act of Congress on 4 February 1919 "to any person who, while in the naval service of the United States, since the sixth day of April, nineteen hundred and seventeen, has distinguished, or who shall hereafter distinguish, himself by extraordinary heroism or distinguished service in the line of his profession, such heroism or service not being sufficient to justify the award of a medal of honor or a distinguished service medal." Two months after the Battle of Midway on 7 August 1942, Congress limited the Navy Cross to combat-only recognition and elevated its status to just below the Medal of Honor" (Navy Cross, 2023, p. 1). It is hard to ignore the significance of the of Congresses decision to upgrade the Navy Cross on August, 1942, just two months following a battle that changed the course of the war. On November 10,1942, the Secretary of the Navy awarded twenty-three Navy Crosses to the pilots of VMF-221, most of them posthumously. I felt it only fitting that I include

of his profession while serving as Squadron Commander and a Pilot in Marine Fighting Squadron TWO HUNDRED TWENTY-ONE (VMF-221), Marine Air Group TWENTY-TWO (MAG-22), Naval Air Station, Midway, during operations of the U.S. Naval and Marine Forces against the invading Japanese Fleet during the Battle of Midway on 4 June 1942. Leading his squadron in a dauntless and aggressive attack against a vastly superior number of Japanese bomber and fighter planes, Major Parks aided in disruption the plans of the enemy and lessening the effectiveness of their attack, thereby contributing materially to the success of our forces. As a result of his courageous and daring tactics and because of the circumstances attendant upon this engagement, there can be little doubt that Major Parks gallantly gave up his life in the service of his country. He displayed the characteristics of a fine leader and excellent airman in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service (Maj. Floyd Bruce Parks, 2014).

The citation hints at the significance of VMF-221 sacrifice. Because of their heroic efforts of the Defenders of Midway. the Japanese were not able to neutralize the threat of Midway's Naval Air Station. The Japanese felt they needed to eliminate Midway's air defenses so they could concentrate on destroying the American fleet when it appeared defend the island. The Japanese assumed that the American Fleet was still at Pearl Harbor having no idea of its true location. The fact that the airstrip on Midway was still operational caused the "fog of war" to creep into Admiral Nagumo's decision making process. The Fog caused uncertainty in their own capabilities and the capabilities of the enemy which made him deviate from his battle plan. When Japanese pilots reported that Midway's airstrip was still operational after the first strike, it caused the Japanese to pause. Assuming that the USN was nowhere near, they made the decision to order a second strike on the airstrip. This change caused chaos on the decks of the Japanese Carriers. Their planes were armed with torpedoes and armored piecing bombs, waiting to pounce on the USN as they sailed to save Midway. A second attack on Midway meant that the Japanese had to change the ordinance carried by their airplanes from torpedoes to high explosive bombs. Torpedoes and armor piercing bombs are designed to penetrate the steel plating of carrier decks and battleship hulls but are ineffective when used to destroy land fortifications. Armor piercing weapons are designed to burrow deep into their targets before detonating,

punching holes in their targets. Conventional bombs explode on contact with a larger impact radius, destroying structures and cratering the area. While in the process of rearming, with bombs and torpedoes stacked on their decks, the United States Navy's bombers and torpedo planes arrived over the Japanese fleet and began their bomb runs. The first bombs to land on the deck of the Japanese carriers set off the torpedoes and bombs that were on their decks, the resulting explosions gave the Americans a victory in a decisive battle that would change the course of history, but that's another story.

Hats ......

In military service, the hat is worn in many forms. Also known as a uniform cover, helmet and shield, each Branch of the Military has its own versions for different purposes. They range from the ballcap design (utility/patrol), boonie, garrison, flat flight, pilot's helmet, fire-fighter's helmet, to the welder's shield, as well as many special edition hats.

The hat is a central part of the military uniform, and is required at all times, whether by men or women. Hats reveal authority, position, officer/enlisted rank and type of work. Each branch of the military has its own versions.

On a construction site, there are hard hats for protection for both civilian and military personnel. The color of the hard hat may indicate an Officer/Supervisor, as well as which craft uses it.

Military pilots have specific types of helmets that communicate, as well as feed the pilot tracking/targeting information on potential threats.

Marine Corps Officers' hats are distinguished by the Quatrefoil design on the top. Tradition holds that during the 19th century, the design was stitched into the Officers' covers to distinguish them to the Marines firing down from the rigging of a boarding ship.



Veteran Organizations, like the American Legion, VFW, Marine Corps League, and AmVets have their own versions as well. The Legion's hats (covers) are mainly ball-cap and garrison cap style. The Garrison cap for Missouri displays the Legion logo, City of the represented Post and Post number, as well as the office held. Also displayed is the Missouri Mule on the front.

Different colors represent Officer level (Post, District, State or National).

When the Post Commander calls a General Meeting to order, he says "Please rise and face the Colors, hand-salute, please <u>uncover</u> and join in the Pledge of Allegiance." After the Chaplain's opening prayer, he says "Cover and be seated". Covers are then worn during the meeting.
